Life at Gillingham School

Gillingham School provides education for all types of young people in our area: boys and girls, rich and poor: academic, sporty, artistic, practical or caring. Students achieve across the whole breadth of school life and all its facets - they are a credit to their school, their families and themselves, and we are very proud of them.

We continue to see a huge amount and pace of change in education, alongside the increasing emphasis on using results data to tell our story, and that of our students. Of course, excellent exam results are crucial to the future life choices of students, but data can reduce us to less than we are. Exam results aren't the only things of value that comes from an education, and for some they aren't even the most important thing that they will take away from their time at school.

We believe in the value of education in its broadest sense:

- that may be excellence in sport, or enthusiasm for engaging in a healthy lifestyle:
- it may be the skills to play a musical instrument or a lifelong appreciation of the arts;
- some will take a particular skill or knowledge that they have learned, that is important to them;
- some will leave with a sense of what is right, of how to treat others and how to manage oneself
- and, of course, we are determined that each individual will leave with the very best exam results that they could possibly achieve, to support them as they progress

through their adult lives.

We aim to ensure that the values, traditions and successes of Gillingham School are maintained and built upon, while responding and reacting to the needs of a modern society, which will be as different to the next generation as today is to the previous one. However, change should not alter the core principles on which this school has been built over the centuries. The school was founded by people in the community, who believed that education should be available to all, independent of wealth; and today it is the one secondary school in the town, providing education for all. Even in the early days, the curriculum did not always follow the accepted norms of the time; instead the children were taught those things that were felt to be important both to them as individuals, and to the wider community; today we resist pressures to make decisions for the benefit of the statistics; rather we set a curriculum that we believe is in the best interests of students. Founders, headteachers and governors have been people of honour who have tried to educate the young people of Gillingham to be worthy citizens and good people; today we strive to follow the Golden Rule, to treat each other as we would be treated.

Gillingham School has always been part of its community, and over the years has helped to shape the town that we live in today. Over its 500+ year history, generations of local residents have been educated here, and those young people then become the parents of the next generation of children, with each generation giving its own unique contribution to the town, and our community. While retaining a sense of history, we constantly look to the future, and how we can make this great town even better for its people. By working together, both can become stronger. The voice of young people is vitally important in shaping Gillingham's future, which is their future, and recently developed links between the school's student council

and Gillingham Town Council has given even greater opportunities to make this a reality.

We may not be able to predict how the school will have changed by the time the current generation of students have become proud parents themselves, but we hope that Gillingham School's history, principles, values and ethos will remain a strong foundation for whatever challenges - and opportunities - the future brings.



Our History

Gillingham School is one of the oldest schools in Dorset and indeed, in the country. The history of how it started continues to have benefits for the school we have today, and we hope that the spirit in which it was founded is still reflected in our culture and ethos.

In 1516, a group of local landowners gave certain lands to form a trust fund, for the purpose of funding a schoolmaster to teach the children of Gillingham (of course in those days that meant boys). These landowners were the men who founded the original Gillingham School; they are the founders that we commemorate each year at our Founders' Day awards ceremony.

These were men who believed in the importance of the future of young people, and in their local community as a whole. As well as founding the school, they contributed funds for maintenance of the church, the local roads and bridges, and to provide support for the poor. There was no central government as we know it today, nor any Dorset County Council, to be held responsible for these things at that time. Small towns like Gillingham would only grow and develop if the wealthier local residents chose to contribute.

Many schools were established in this way: many of them didn't stand the test of time and are no more; others invested in expanding, by a combination of larger donations and through charging tuition fees, and gradually developed into the famous public schools of Britain; some, like Gillingham, continued quietly and efficiently as schools serving their community, eventually becoming grammar schools and comprehensive schools.

Over the centuries, the school has had several incarnations, but the link back to its foundation is continuous. Gillingham Free School was established in a building opposite St Mary The Virgin church. The school expanded through to the 19th century; in 1876 it moved into new buildings on this present site and became Gillingham Grammar School. In 1903 the school became a grant-aided school, with education paid for from public funds from that time onwards, also opening its doors to students from the nearby part of Wiltshire. In 1916 girls were admitted for the first time (although there had been a separate school for younger girls for some time which was then absorbed). In 1940 a second (secondary modern) school was built on the same site, so that children of all abilities were catered for, but then, in 1959, these were amalgamated back into the single Gillingham School - then as now providing education for all types of young people in the area: boys and girls; rich and poor; academic, sporty, artistic, practical or caring.

Gillingham School is now a large statefunded school, however the trust fund started by the Founders has remained and been added to throughout our history. Each year it provides a small but extra income that allows us to do a few extra things - like give prizes on celebration days; provide financial support for students who need extra funds to pursue a particular talent; or pay entry fees so that teams of students can enter national competitions in sport, music, maths or others. Our board of governors has a special responsibility to administer the trust, to maximise the income and to ensure that it is spent for the good of the education of the children of Gillingham and its surrounding area.

Gillingham Sixth Form

Gillingham has a popular and successful Sixth Form and we are proud of our record in enabling all students to reach their potential.

We offer over 30 A Levels and an increasing number of BTEC and other vocational qualifications. We also offer a Level 1&2 (GCSE equivalent) programme for our students.

There are excellent study facilities available to our Sixth Formers, including two purpose-built study areas that include access to over 70 computers.

We pride ourselves on the individualised support and guidance available to all our students. More than 70% of our students progress onto university courses including many who join Russell Group institutions and some who progress to Oxford or Cambridge. Increasingly, students are also successfully accessing, with support, a range of apprenticeships and degree apprenticeships after university.

As well as experiencing outstanding academic provision, our students also enjoy a full enrichment programme. This includes in-depth consideration of a range of social and personal issues, from an impressive array of external speakers and agencies.

Our students also have fun! We are proud of our enrichment activities which range from the biannual Surf trip to Spain to the annual 'extravaganza.'

Support for Learning at Gillingham

Support for Learning is provided through a variety of ways.

Firstly, one such way is through the pastoral system which is made up of year groups: 7 through to 13, within that, students are placed in tutor groups and tutors are the first point of contact for anything relating to a student's welfare.

Each year group has an allocated Head of Year who is supported by Deputy Heads of Year. The pastoral system works alongside the curriculum system in order to complement students' performance, achievement and wellbeing.

Expectations of conduct at Gillingham are based on our beliefs that all members of our community are important, are to be valued, have the right to learn, work, progress and develop to the best of their ability, and to be treated with respect and dignity.

As a school, we endeavour to ensure that all students feel safe whilst they are with us.

One of the school's undoubted strengths is the support we offer to meet the individual needs of each student.

We have a strong SEN department and a skilled, experienced team of teaching assistants trained to work with individual students to increase their skills, confidence and motivation. There is a particular emphasis on literacy and numeracy skills, especially with younger students.







Enrichment at Gillingham

At Gillingham, we offer a bewildering range of enrichment activities that enhance our curriculum provision, provide students with opportunities to further their sporting and creative talents, and enable them to have fun!

Trips

We run numerous trips throughout the year including a number of foreign trips. Our students have, in recent years, visited theatres across the country, attended numerous art galleries, completed fieldwork in a variety of locations, listened to talks at Chalke Valley History Festival and visited the Harry Potter Film Studios.

Biennial foreign trips include a ski trip, a surf trip to Spain and a music tour. There is an A Level trip to Belgium, a Mediterranean trip, which includes canoeing down the Ardeche Gorge and, every year, our students partake in the German and French Exchange.

Activity Groups and Clubs

We have a strong sporting reputation at the school with highly successful teams throughout the years in sports such as football, rugby, hockey, netball, cricket, rounders, equestrian and athletics. We compete with local schools and in national competitions throughout the year. Large numbers of students may take up the opportunity to participate in numerous lunchtime clubs, coaching and after-school fixtures, many going on to achieve county and national success. For others, school sport is a foundation of an active and healthy adult life.

Increasingly, we are expanding the range of sports and physical activities on offer at our school. Students now have the opportunity to play table tennis at lunchtimes, climb on our indoor wall, mountain bike, and attend a local gym or dance group.

Creative Arts

Our superb Creative Arts building provides students with the latest facilities in Music, Drama and Art. Students are encouraged to utilise these facilities. during lunchtime clubs. We have many musicians, artists-inresidence and theatre companies visiting the school all of which enrich our Creative Arts Programme.

Our annual school productions and concerts are wonderful opportunities for students to involve themselves in the arts whether they want to perform, design, work backstage or help front of house.

Learning Outside the Classroom

During their time at Gillingham, students will have numerous opportunities to partake in various curriculum related and non-curriculum school trips. The range and quality of these trips is a really strong feature and strength of our school.

We run an unbelievable range of foreign trips, theatre and art gallery visits, and a comprehensive programme of outdoor pursuits. There are curriculum trips that include fieldwork opportunities, STEM and Science focuses, and places of historical significance. There are also trips for fun and rewards to various theme parks and sporting events.

Preparing for Work

All of our students undertake Work Experience in Year 10 for two weeks. This takes place at a wide range of local and not-so-local workplaces including businesses, banks, libraries, offices, schools and veterinary surgeries. The opportunity to experience a working environment first hand is invariably a valuable one.

We are committed to ensuring that students receive the quality impartial advice and guidance relating to career choice and career planning from a broad range of sources.

Students will gain confidence to examine their strengths and weaknesses, set themselves targets and develop the ability to respond to learning opportunities and employment trends.

Students have access to specialist support services when required.

Careers and Aspirations

Our Aspirations and Careers Programme includes visits to universities and employers, as well as, employers and ex-students visiting our current pupils to inform and inspire them about possible future career options.

All of our students undertake Work Experience in both Year 10 and 12; the opportunity to experience a working environment first hand is invariably a valuable one.

We are committed to ensuring that students receive high quality impartial advice and guidance relating to careers planning from a broad range of sources which, includes access to a fully qualified careers advisor.



Working in Partnership

We encourage communication between home and school through our newsletters, homework diaries, parents' evenings, events, ParentMail and more - after all, we rely on your support in your child's education.

Progress

As parents, you will receive your child's Progress Report in December, and a full Annual Report later in the year.

The Progress Report monitors effort, achievement, behaviour and organisation for each subject and the Annual Report is a more detailed account of the progress made over the academic year with National Curriculum levels and predicted exam grades.

Homework

All of our students throughout Key Stage 3, 4 and 5 can expect to receive homework in the subjects they are studying. This is an essential part of learning which allows students to reinforce and extend the work started in the classroom.

Students receive homework diaries and class timetables each September which assists with their organisation and the development of individual study skills.

Usually students will not be asked to complete homework for the next day, enabling them to develop the important skill of planning their time to include clubs and activities.

We encourage you to take an active interest in your child's school work by checking and signing their diary weekly.

Child Protection Act


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
