





Higher & Degree Apprenticeship

- You will need A levels to do Higher or Degree Apprenticeship
- With a Degree Apprenticeship you will be doing the degree that you would be doing at university
- You will also have a contract of employment with an employer, earn a salary and have your apprenticeship paid for
- You will be putting the theoretical side that you are learning at university into practice in the job role that you have
- You will achieve a mix of academic and professional qualifications


Retention



Tuition Fees

- £6,000 £9,250 per year
- Exceptions: BMBS Medicine and courses with a year abroad / year in industry
- Fees don't need to be paid up front
- Not endless duration of course or 4 years maximum given in most circumstances





Tuition Fees

- Eligibility UK nationals or Irish citizens, settled under the EU settlement scheme or have been granted indefinite leave to remain.
- This money never goes into their bank account
- Student does not need to borrow the money if self-funding but research if this is cost effective in your situation.





Maintenance Loan

- Eligible students can apply for this to help towards basic living costs.
- Everyone can have the minimum; some people are eligible for more based on household income.
- Important to understand what they are entitled to so they can independently budget
- Most students have a shortfall





What counts as household income



Combined parental income if student lives with both



Father Income if student lives with Dad



Mother Income if student lives with Mum



Dad and stepparent or new partner if living with student



Mum and stepparent or new partner if living with student



Partner Income if student is married or aged 25+ and living with partner

If students are under 25 and financially depend on at least one parent.

The household income includes:

- parents' income, if they live with them or depend on them financially
- the combined income of one parents and their partner, if a student lives with them (not the income of the family they do not live with)
- Those you are dependent on only not lodgers, older siblings etc

Maintenance loan

- Based on the previous tax year so for 2024 entry will look at earnings in 2022-2023, if circumstances change students can complete an in-year assessment.
- Have a go with the calculator, it is a guide, students will need to complete their application before they get a final figure.
- Confirm every year, to reflect if circumstances change



Living Costs (catered accommodation)

Parental Contribution

- The government expects parents to contribute to their child's student maintenance loan to cover university living costs
- The amount of parental contribution varies depending on where the parents live, regardless of where in the UK child studies
- If you have other financially dependent children, (usually under 25 or under and in either school, FE or HE). Your "residual income" is reduced by £1,130 a year for every dependent child.





Paying back government loans

Annual salary	Total monthly repayment

Repayment

Earn £5,000 more than the threshold, so would repay 9% on the £5,000

Student loan works out at £37.50 per month

If income changes amount being paid back changes to reflect this

Pay 9% on these earnings

Take home **£22,310**

National Insurance £2,254

Extra help

Students might be able to get extra money if they:

- are under 25, have no contact with parents and financially support themselves
- pay for childcare
- are a full-time student with children
- have an adult who depends on them financially
- have a disability, mental or physical health problem or learning difficulty like dyslexia






Support related to specific courses

- Student loan applications are expected to open end of February/March
- Last year, the deadline was mid-May
- Apply online through Student Finance England
- Other finance will have differing deadlines after this dependent on students' circumstances





Next Steps

- Check the Government Calculator to check Tuition and Maintenance Loan amounts
- Apply on time this can take time to get paperwork in order
- Talk about how they plan to manage their money, have they researched the costs?
- Look at what the university can offer, are they eligible for anything extra.






Destinations of 2014/15 Graduating Cohort -









Graduate earnings by university
